



letter from the CEO

When our world and communities experience dramatic change, what we expect and need from our public schools changes, too.

The education sector, and BES as an organization, have continued to evolve significantly over the past year to meet the changing needs of students, families, and communities. The challenges of the last few years have resulted in educator burnout and shortages, at a time when student learning gaps continue to widen.

We believe that, now more than ever, BES's charge to **identify and prepare excellent** leaders to transform education in their communities is the right one, and one that can play a key role in shaping the future of teaching and learning. This is evidenced by the six new Fellow-founded schools that opened doors in fall 2022 and the four (and counting) schools from the 2021 Fellow cohort that were authorized to open in the coming two years, amidst an increasingly challenging authorizing landscape across the country.

We are now in the final year of our current strategic plan – a plan that marked a necessary and fundamental shift to BES's approach. We vowed to center community in our work, to continue our push to be antiracist, to expand impact through scaled programming, and to set the organization up to sustain its work year over year.

In 2022, we returned to in-person training and school visits and significantly revised our curriculum to be more learner-focused and equity-centered. Thanks to the support of our generous funders and partners, we have continued to expand the number and types of schools we study to include over 100 schools across the country with a wide variety of models, sizes, focus areas, and leadership perspectives. We have established 17 new national, state, and community partnerships, and have established or scaled our presence in 23 regions.

At the same time, we are looking ahead to the next five years at BES, during which we will continue our incubation efforts while expanding the pipeline building and leadership development work we know is necessary to sustain generational change in communities across the country.

As we plan for a new era, we are inspired by the opportunities for impact, strong as a team, and well-positioned to deepen our work toward both excellence and equity in the national education landscape.

I am confident that we, collectively, can and will rise to the challenge and opportunity that the new year brings.

Now more than ever, BES is working alongside local partners and identifying diverse leaders with a strong vision for schooling who place community input at the center of their work. With six BES Fellows opening schools across the country in fall 2022 and a cohort of 10 leaders currently building their vision for an excellent and equitable school, we continue to expand the number of regions and students served through our work.



9 out of 10

charter applications submitted by BES Fellows have been authorized nationwide.

According to NACSA, only 34% of freestanding charter applications across 19 states and Washington, D.C. were approved in 2017-2018.

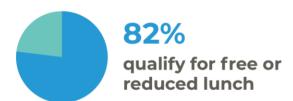

2022 Fellows are hard at work engaging families in Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, Tennessee, and Texas as they design unique and community-responsive school models that are committed to academic rigor, career pathways, character formation, and student well-being. The proposed models will serve students across the K-12 continuum and include Montessori, entrepreneurship, project-based learning, and STEAM/STREAM.

In public schools nationwide, **52%** of students qualify for free or reduced lunch, **10%** are English language learners, and **15%** have special needs.

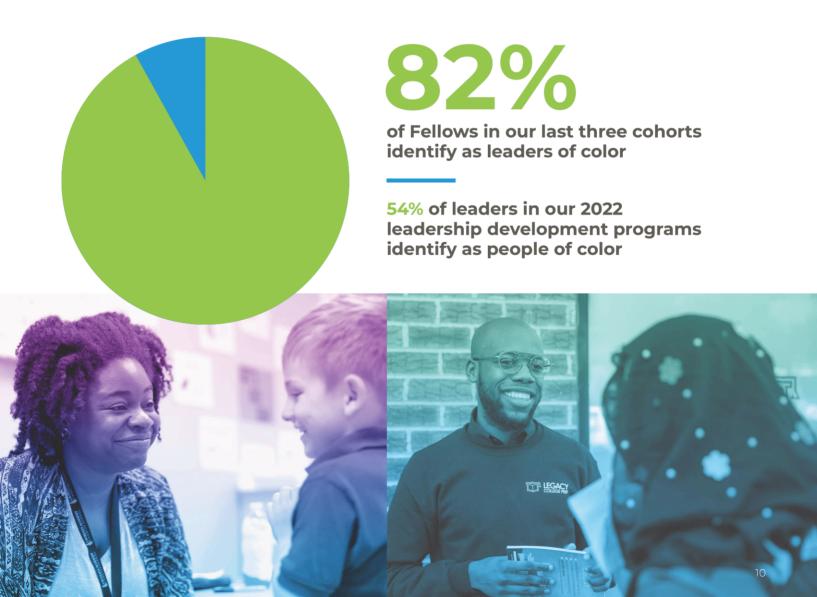

At BES, we recognize that leaders need to be supported and challenged in the right way at the right time. From yearlong cohort-based trainings to short, two-day intensives, to coaching tailored to specific needs, our leadership and organizational development programs are designed to do just that.

Our cohorts are intentionally diverse and reflective of the communities we serve because we know - and research increasingly shows - that better life outcomes are linked to shared identity and culture between students, teachers, and leaders.



Since 2012, LENS - our premier year-long, cohort-based leadership development program for emerging and experienced leaders - has successfully trained

over 300 leaders.

75% of LENS participants have moved into heightened leadership roles after completing the program.

This year, 100% of of LENS participants reported being satisfied or extremely satisfied with their experience.

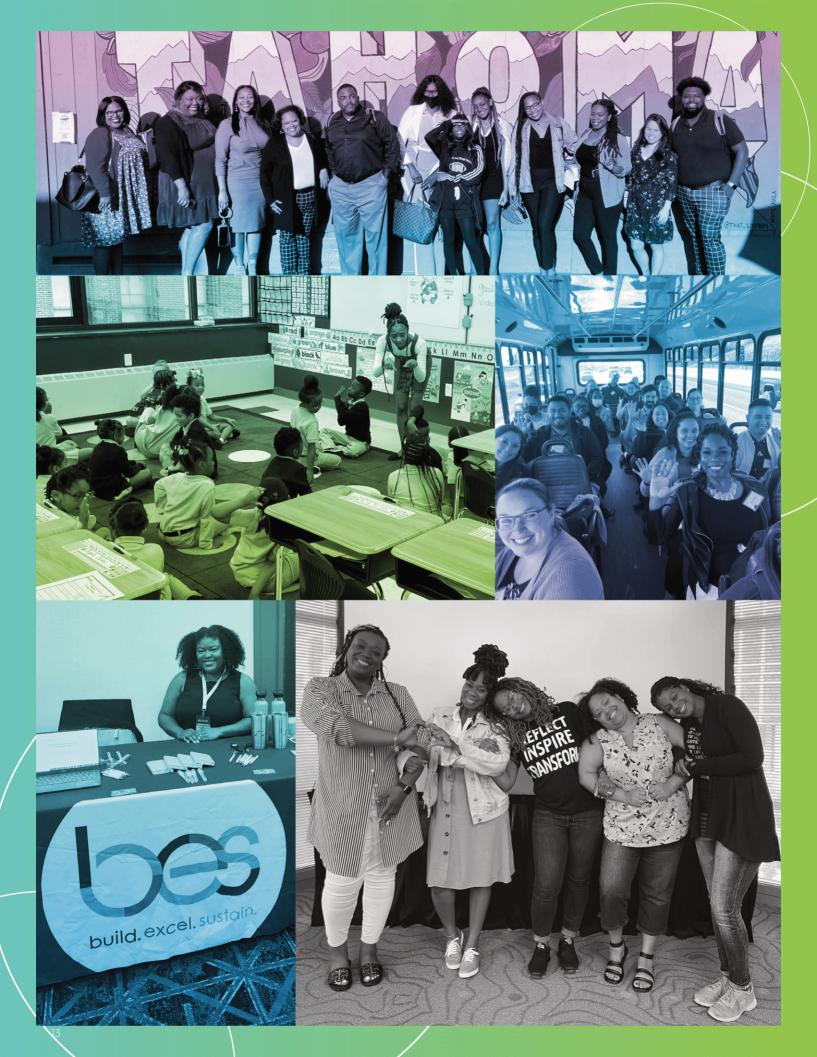

Over the past three years, BES has leveraged local and national partnerships to strengthen our collective work towards shared goals. We are committed to continuing this collaboration in an effort to combine our national reach and existing infrastructure with the local insight, expertise, and advocacy we know is needed to ensure that our leaders and schools are successful. Our partners include local education champion organizations, regional incubators, charter associations, advocacy organizations, and national organizations that work on condition building and pipeline generation in our space.

BES worked in partnership with 12 local education champion organizations and charter associations in 2022.

BES designed and delivered multiple custom leadership trainings for partners interested in specific topics that would benefit leaders in their region.

Partner organizations at the local and national levels have supported Fellowship seats and sponsored leaders in LENS, enabling us to design and deliver ecosystem level support in several regions.
